Annual Report 2018/19

Season's Greetings!

Firstly, thank you to all our supporters for enabling us to continue our work for another year. Without you the Trust would be unable to function.

In 2017/18 we have continued our support for the five schools where we sponsor students. As you will see in the accounts, this year we had to dip into our reserves as fees have increased. After intense discussion in the UK and Lesotho we have agreed to do more to meet the needs of the large number of AIDS orphans in the Kingdom (see trustee, Rebecca Chandler-Wilde's article below). We are therefore going to increase the number of students supported at each school by three.

Unless the cost is met by increased support from our donors, we will have to use reserves to fund this vital uplift in the help we can provide. We are aware that all our supporters are extremely generous. HIV and AIDS - Lesotho's "natural disaster"



HIV is a virus that attacks the immune system. If infected, a person can develop AIDS, a total breakdown of the immune system, leaving the body incapable of fighting off other diseases. We are very fortunate in the UK. In the

early 1980s, after the dramatic government warnings about HIV and AIDS, treatment programmes and advice on prevention were quickly put into place. Effective drugs, free on the NHS have reduced HIV prevalence in

the UK to about 0.16% of the population and in 2015 less than 1% of people living with HIV here died. People in the UK, if diagnosed in time, can have a normal life expectancy.

Sadly this is not the case in Lesotho where, despite steadily increasing testing and treatment and a declining infection rate, the adult HIV prevalence rate of 23.9% is still the second highest in the world¹. This is largely due to poverty and partly to cultural practices. The pandemic causes a multitude of family tragedies; in 2003, the Ministry of Health estimated that there were around 100,000 children under the age of 15 in Lesotho's 10 districts who had lost one or both parents to AIDS.

But in addition, it destroys the country's economy as more experienced workers die and are replaced by younger, less experienced workers. That's why King Letsie III has declared AIDS a "natural disaster" for Lesotho, disproportionately affecting the rural working-age population where most of Lesotho's population lives.

The lack of sexual education programs in schools means that younger people are at increased risk of HIV infection. HIV negatively impacts educational outcomes as children, particularly girls, are less likely to attend school or complete primary school because they are expected to care for sick family members or younger siblings orphaned by AIDS.

All of this means that providing a route for young women and men to train in useful vocational skills is more important than ever and the investment in training and development by BET is helping many students to help themselves, but also to help others and their country as they put their new skills to use.
